#### **MANUFACTURING 4.0 GRANT OPPORTUNITY**

During the pandemic, many manufacturing businesses in lowa stayed open, continuing to keep people on the job and supplying much-needed goods and services around the world. However, due to illnesses, childcare woes, school closures, etc., these same businesses did not always have the workforce necessary to maintain its production. This encouraged the state of lowa to come out with the Manufacturing 4.0 Grant program.

This program was designed to help small-to-midsize lowa manufacturers invest in the adoption of and integration of smart technologies with grant funding made available through the federal American Rescue Plan Act. This grant was launched to ensure the state's manufacturers continued to remain globally competitive through emphasis on automation and smart technology.



The Manufacturing 4.0 Grant Program offers two grant opportunities to prioritize both aspects of advanced technology: The equipment itself and the connectivity of the product. These grant programs are only for manufacturing companies that have between 3 and 150 employees. The two different grant awards are:



- ◆ The Manufacturing Innovation Equipment grant awards up to \$50,000 for the purchase of machinery and specialized equipment to improve operations. Eligible project include: Machinery acquisition, such as a 3-D printer; Specialized equipment for automation, such as collaborative robots; Advanced and autonomous robotics; and Equipment for process improvements.
- ◆ The Manufacturing Industrial Internet of Things Infrastructure Investment grant awards up to \$25,000 for the purchase of specialized hardware or software in

Industry 4.0 Technology groups. Eligible projects include: Infrastructure hardware, such as enhanced server equipment to enable more cloud computing; Cybersecurity Software; Predictive Maintenance Software; Data Analytics Software/Engineering; Data Visualization Software; Augmented Reality Equipment; Radio Frequency Identification tagging software and equipment to track inventory; and much more.

#### IOWA WORKS AN ASSET TO LOCAL EMPLOYERS

lowa WORKS is lowa's network of American Job Centers, which are part of a one-stop shop solution created to provide universal access to an integrated system of employment services. Job seekers can get help researching the job market, figuring out what careers they qualify for, learn about potential pay, and a variety of other topics.

Employers have multiple benefits from the Iowa WORKS website as well. Whether you're developing, expanding, or consolidating your business, IWD can help facilitate your workforce needs. Their experts can provide one-on-one assistance with a host of questions, whether you're looking for help with recruiting, tax credits to hire new employees, customized training opportunities, or detailed information about your labor market. Some of the services that Iowa Works can provides include:

- 1. Job postings go nationally along with advertising on social media by lowa Works for free.
- 2. Employers can list certain requirements for their jobs and only candidates that match those requirements will be sent to them, which helps employers save on sorting through applications.
- 3. Employers can elect to be notified about Veterans looking for work etc.
- 4. If they have a current job website, employers can have it indexed from their own job site, so they don't have to duplicate their work.

Additionally, Iowa WORKS focuses on keeping area employers informed on upcoming trainings and job fairs in the area. Many resources, such as Goodwill of the Heartland, has free trainings such as computer skills, custodial technician, informational technology, and more! Other training opportunities for the Jones County region would be through Kirkwood and can be accessed here:

Finally, lowa WORKS can assist in those areas where transitions or turnover might occur. IWD can help your business with surviving a slowdown by assisting with turnover and layoff aversion through the Voluntary Shared Work program as well as the Incumbent Worker Training Program. Under the Voluntary Work Program, work reductions are shared by reducing employees' work hours while Unemployment Insurance partially replaces lost earnings. By avoiding layoffs, employees stay connected to their jobs and a skilled workforce is maintained for the business. The Incumbent Worker Training Program is designed to meet the special requirements of an employer to retain a skilled workforce or avert the need to lay off employees by assisting local works in obtaining the skills necessary to retain employment.



## Broadband Intervention Zone Application Completed for Jones County

Jones County Economic
Development recently applied for
Jones County to be recognized
as a Broadband Intervention
Zone. This means that there are
areas in Jones County that are
unserved or underserved by
broadband internet.

The application asked for an area within the county to be designated as a Broadband Intervention Zone. The area chosen can be show in the map diagram below. While not all of Jones County can be included, the addresses in this circle represent the majority of the county.



If designated, telecom providers in Jones County would have the opportunity to go after federal funding to install more broadband internet into those underserved or unserved areas.

Please note that this designation does not guarantee funding or that any telecom will be able to provide service.

#### IOWA'S TARGETED SMALL BUSINESS PROGRAM

Starting a small business can be a challenge, especially when it feels like there are not a lot of resources out there to get started or overcome hurdles. Jones County Economic Development and the State of lowa understand that creating and helping maintain opportunities for diverse businesses is key to continuing economic growth and vibrancy in our region. The State of lowa's Certified Targeted Small Business Program is designed to help women, individuals with minority status, service-connected disabled veterans and individuals with disabilities overcome some of those hurdles that can impede starting or growing a business. Support is given through both certification as a targeted small business and through microloans to businesses.

To qualify, a business must meet the following criteria:

- Located in the state of lowa
- Operating for a profit
- Make less than \$4 million in gross income
- Majority owned (51%) by a woman, individual with minority status, service disabled veteran, or an individual with a disability.



Additionally, certification can provide a host of other benefits. This includes listing on the State's Directory; invitations to exclusive events; introductions to partners who aid with state purchasing; and more. All departments within the state are required to establish annual projections for spending with these certified businesses and report on their goals.

These procurement benefits include:

- Access to a bid notification site to view state procurement opportunities 48 hours in advance of the state posting publicly
- Ability to access non-competitive bids for under \$25,000
- Bond waivers for up to \$50,000 for state projects, if unable to secure a bond because of the lack of experience, net worth, or capital



Finally, the Targeted Small Business Program also offer loans through this assistance program. The criteria to qualify are the same except a business does not have to be certified to obtain a loan. Loans are available for up to \$50,000 for startup or existing businesses. These funds can be used for business improvements and expenses. These loans include favorable fixed interest rates, fixed monthly payments, and non-pre-payment penalties.

If you are a business being run by a woman, individuals with minority status, service-connected disabled veterans and individuals with

disabilities, this program is worth looking into to see if it might help you and your business grow in the state of lowa. For more information, you can go to:

One of the key aspects of this program is that manufacturing companies can apply for both grants simultaneously, meaning that a company can apply for up to \$75,000 for the two grants over the lifetime of the business. However, companies should be aware that there are restrictions on the grant applicant:

- Manufacturing companies must have between 3 and 150 full-time employees.
- II. Manufacturing companies must have a 1:1 match. Any cost over the \$75,000 match portion of the grant will be paid by the company receiving the grant.
- III. Prior to applying, manufacturers must complete an Industry 4.0 Assessment provided by Iowa State University's Center for Industrial Research and Service (CIRAS) to determine need and readiness.

Derek Lumsden, Jones County Economic Development Executive Director, commented that, "We have had a number of businesses go through the process to see if their project might be viable. From there, I set up the CIRAS visit and get them to town as soon as possible to review the operation and make suggestions that ultimately strengthen any application. Jones County has been very lucky so far to have received four CIRAS recommendations for Manufacturing 4.0 grant applications to be submitted on behalf of local businesses. And we hope that number continues to expand."

Derek can be on hand to walk through your project with you to see if it meets the guidelines, set up the CIRAS visit, and assist with the grant paperwork. Grant applications must be submitted through www.iowagrants.gov and grant applications are open now. Grant applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until funding is expended.
