Jones County Economic Development (JCED) is a public-private partnership dedicated to strengthening the economic base in Jones County by assisting existing businesses, attracting new investment and jobs, and fostering a business climate favorable for economic growth. JCED does this by focusing in many different areas, including workforce development, quality of life amenities, housing, childcare, internet, and many more. In all of the work we do, we are always asking what value can we bring to Jones County and how can we make sure those local investments last well into the future.

The quote above from Shelby Davis illustrates the point that everyone, especially communities and businesses, should invest for the long haul. What investments can we make today that will help define the futures of our businesses and communities? Too often, this comes down to the financial realities of the moment for everyone. Businesses and communities like to see money spent that has an immediate return on that investment so the money does not feel wasted. While great in concept, many things that happen in life are incremental and happen over time, whether building a solid customer base for your business or developing affordable housing in your community. This is where Jones County Economic Development plays a vital role in the community and economic development of our region. Jones County Economic Development continues to find ways to improve community and quality of life amenities, like trails; we work to figure out the needs of employers and work to get workforce trained in those upcoming arenas; JCED has been active in the childcare sector and will continue working with affordable housing over the next few years; and we have been instrumental in the upcoming fiber internet project in Jones County. All of these initiatives and accomplishments are due to the investments made into JCED by local businesses and communities. Communities and businesses know these items are important, but they also know that they do not have the time or manpower to commit to realizing them. Therefore, they invest in Jones County Economic Development, allowing us to hire a full-time Executive Director that can help in many facets of community growth and development.

Over the last few years, these investments have paid dividends even though it took time. Anamosa has done some massive downtown storefront work and will do two more phases, with Phase 2 starting this month! Monticello saw the arrival of Dollar Fresh and the Monticello Main Street Program. Wyoming and Oxford Junction both saw upper story housing and Wyoming saw the emergence of a new restaurant. Onslow and Olin partnered on a consultant visit to help revitalize their downtowns, even as those communities shrink or stagnate.

Jones County Economic Development is a resource that all businesses and communities can utilize to help fulfill their goals and dreams. However, there are costs associated with utilizing other resources and that's why JCED does a membership drive every year, asking businesses and communities that want to see improvement invest in the organization, to allow JCED to do the work that needs done in cooperation and collaboration with other entities in our region. Investing for the long haul is the best way to create current and future opportunities and we hope all of our businesses and communities will be investors for years to come.

REGIONAL FOCUS TAKES SHAPE THROUGH ENVISION EAST CENTRAL IOWA

Over the last two years, Jones County Economic Development has been involved with helping create a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy. This is required every five years for every Economic Development District and is necessary for application to federal grants, etc. Jones County is part of the ECICOG region and works with five other counties to help draft this strategy. The one recently finished was entitled: Envision East Central Iowa.

This plan creates regional strategies to help reinvent and propel our six-county region to even greater prominence in Iowa and the Midwest. While all six counties (Benton, Iowa, Johnson, Jones, Linn, and Washington) are working on their own initiatives to remain relevant and work towards a brighter future, this combined focus is helping the region collaborate in a greater fashion, especially with the auspices of ECICOG. Aside from the individual aspects of the Envision East Central Iowa plan, ECICOG is spear-heading two major initiatives over the next few months:

First, ECICOG is preparing a regional Priority Climate Action Plan. A Priority Climate Action Plan includes priority projects for reducing greenhouse gas emissions in the region. Projects must be identified in the plan for cities, counties, and other public bodies (28E organizations, special districts, etc.) to apply for a Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program (CPRG) Implementation Grant. Applications are due April 1, 2024, and projects will be awarded in October 2024. These grants will allow regional climate opportunities a chance to compete for grant money between \$2 million and \$500 million. Since the plan is an eligibility requirement for the CPRG Implementation Grant, the final Priority Climate Action Plan will only include shovel-ready projects that cities, counties, and/or other public bodies are willing to apply for funds to implement as soon as October 2024. Long-term projects may be included in a Comprehensive Climate Action Plan that will be developed starting in summer 2024. More information will be coming as the plan develops.

A second initiative focuses on mobility, especially relating to recreational activities around walking and biking. The Active Transportation Plan is being created to see how many people walk and bike in our region and what is keeping more people from doing so. Some of the immediate highlights of the developing plan:

- When people DO walk or bike, they do it for recreational or health-related purposes. Over 70 people noted that they bike or walk for the health-related benefits.
- People enjoy walking and biking on paved trails in the region. Where there
 are no paved trails, sidewalks can work at times.
- Many of the communities in Jones County have a need to update their sidewalk infrastructure. Some communities have major gaps in sidewalks, making walkers and bikers have to use the street and increase their risk of being in an auto-related accident.
- Users would like to see more money go towards paving trails that connect
 places within Jones County and the region to each other. In fact, 42% of
 responders noted that they would use a paved trail network for biking if there
 was one in the region. 86% of responders say that they wanted more paved
 trail and connected trails in the region.

ECICOG will continue working to refine the plan after input from the six-county region and in cooperation with Pillar 5 of the Envision East Central lowa plan that is geared towards tourism. The goal is to find ways to encourage more biking and walking to meet the needs and demands of the region's denizens, but also to find ways to connect our major tourist assets and attractions as we build a regional space where people want to come to spend time and money.

FENCE ART RETURNS TO DOWNTOWN ANAMOSA

Much like air is a necessity for the physical endurance of the body, so too is art a necessity for the soul. And Jones County has always been exceedingly lucky to have been home to many artists, not the least of which was Grant Wood. Following in his footsteps, Jones County has been able to boast many a local artist and we continue to cultivate them in many way. Recently, Jones County Economic Development, Arts Court, Maquoketa Valley REC, and Metal Design Systems all teamed up to help recreate the REC pole yard fence into a downtown art display.

Years prior, the fence had held art made by local artists and the banners had hung for all to see. However, after the 2020 derecho, most was destroyed and had to come down. REC asked if there was a way to get new art installed and hopefully have it last longer, so they asked local artist and business owner, KC Wortman. Wortman stated that if a quality material and paint could be secured, then it would be relatively simple to get local artists to do the work.

Jones County Economic Development assisted with the Paint Iowa Beautiful grant for the project. As noted on the Paint Iowa Beautiful website, "Keeping up the appearance of our buildings, facilities and parks is an important component of viable communities. Well-maintained and painted buildings reflect pride in our communities. Thousands of gallons of paint have been donated to community groups through the Paint Iowa Beautiful program. The program provides free paint to a wide variety of public service projects throughout Iowa."



Additionally, Jones County Economic Development worked with Metal Design Systems in Anamosa to find a resilient base for the paint. Ultimately six metal panels were donated to the project that would hold paint well and stand up to most severe weather. Wortman, Katie Kilburg, and two classes of art students at Thou Art Gallery combined to design and paint the six panels. Over the Christmas holiday, Maquoketa Valley REC finished hanging them up.

"Art is one of those visuals that people see that can really help sell a community, both for residents and tourists," noted Derek Lumsden, Executive Director of Jones County Economic Development. "This program helps take some of the cost of materials out of the equation, making it more likely that communities will find ways to keep their downtowns vibrant and aesthetically pleasing. And don't forget to thank the artists that put the time and effort into these pieces.

They are a great addition to downtown Anamosa and we will hopefully see more work from them in the future." You can see the

finished art projects on the alley side behind Main Street on the west side of Huber Street across the Maquoketa Valley REC offices.





NEW VISITOR DATA DASHBOARD TO HELP SPUR TOURISM FOCUS

Businesses are always wanting to know more about their customers, especially those from out of town. Where are they from? Why are they here? What brought them into their business? How did they find out about it? While some of those questions are easily asked in the store, sometimes it's nice to have data to back up what you are hearing.

Jones County Economic Development is partnering with the Iowa Tourism Office to use their Arrivalist Data Dashboard in 2024. Communities throughout Iowa are already using this data to inspire new campaigns and initiative aimed at attracting more tourism to their downtown businesses and destinations. The data allows for a number of different metrics, but some of the most exciting will be:

- Being able to see the specific time of year when visitors are coming to Jones County and being able
 to use that information to help determine what cities or areas of the country are best for future ad
 placement to spur return trips
- Comparing numbers to other communities in the region and those of similar sizes to see if there is a trend that can be built upon, including quality of life amenities. This data can help show local officials and grant organizations that there is a quantifiable need for creation and improvement.
- Sharing information with local hotel/motel marketing committees to help them understand traveler trends as well as to develop goals and marketing strategies for increasing overnight stays.

Arrivalist tracks data for domestic adults (18+) who are traveling at least 50 miles from their home location, spend at least two hours in lowa, and take up to a 14-day roundtrip. Every day commuters are

excluded. Data is pulled from devices with regular GPS pings and smart phones. Jones County Economic Development is excited to use this data to help businesses learn more about their non-local customer base and as a way to drive more tourism to the region.















Bike Seasonally


